## Features of Interest

### 1. Government House

The main part of the residence was built in 1891. John Lawrence Baird Stonehaven, Australia's 8th Governor-General, was the first to live in the house in the 1920s.

### 2. The Vista Lawn

The Vista Lawn is used for events ranging from kids cricket games for charity to the annual Canberra Symphony Orchestra Prom Concert.

### 3. The Lakeside Lawn

Offering a unique and distinctively Canberra view, the Lakeside Lawn is used for ceremonial welcomes of visiting Heads of State.

### 4. The Hasluck Rhododendron Garden

Constructed during the term of Australia's 17th Governor-General, the garden features magnolias, azaleas and rhododendrons.

### 5. Lady Gowrie's Garden

Constructed during the term of Australia's 10th Governor-General, the garden features a fountain in the memory of Lord and Lady Gowrie's son Patrick who was killed in WWII.

### 6. The Bravery Garden

Initiated by Sir William Deane, Australia's 22nd Governor-General, this remembrance garden recognises the service and bravery of outstanding Australians.

### 7. Stables

Today, the stables are used as a garage for official vehicles (including the Rolls Royce) and office spaces. The last Governor-General to keep a horse at Government House was Sir William Deane.

### ^ Outbuildings

Originally cottages for staff who lived on the grounds of Government House. Outbuildings are used as office spaces.
